I am most privileged, fortunate and delighted to warmly welcome you to this august occasion being organized by the Ilorin Emirate Descendants' Progressive Union, IEDPU, to address the unpalatable and worsening economic situation that is bedevilling the Ilorin Emirate, particularly in recent times.

Although, Ilorin had never been the most industrialized or commercialized entity in Nigeria, the Emirate, some years back, was biased with so many industrial and commercial outfits which enhanced the economic well-being and respectability of the people of the Emirate.

Understandably, the Union, as the umbrella socio-cultural platform of the people of the Emirate, had been consistently inundated with persistent complaints, sufferings, dislocations and malady encountered by our compatriots over the years due to crippling unemployment and the diseased social system.

The persistence of these problems, as observed by the union coupled with the patriotic observations of participants at the last National Conference of the Union held in December, 2011, compelled her to engage in series of activities that eventually culminated in today's event

I must say that the conviction of the Union that the reversal of the dwindling economic fortune of the Ilorin Emirate community required concerted efforts of stakeholders informed the convocation of this intellectual engagement.
